More support for victims of family and sexual violence

As part of Alberta's plan to improve the lives of vulnerable children and families, more supports are being added so victims of family violence and sexual abuse can better access the help they need.

New resources to sexual assault centres will address wait times, add more staff to improve access to services in rural Alberta and increase collaboration of services for child victims of sexual abuse. An additional \$2 million was provided across Alberta for an annual total of nearly \$4 million.

"Sexual assault and family violence are difficult to talk about, but victims deserve the best system of supports that we can offer. This increased commitment will ensure that victims get the help they need when they need it."

\$3 million will support 70 more beds for women's emergency shelters, especially in high-needs areas, to address the greater demand for shelter spaces, services and outreach workers.

"Victims need to know that the community supports them and has the services in place to help them heal. This funding will allow us to work with our community partners to raise awareness of the issue."

An additional \$1 million will be provided to contracted shelters for salary and benefit increases to help retain and recruit staff.
